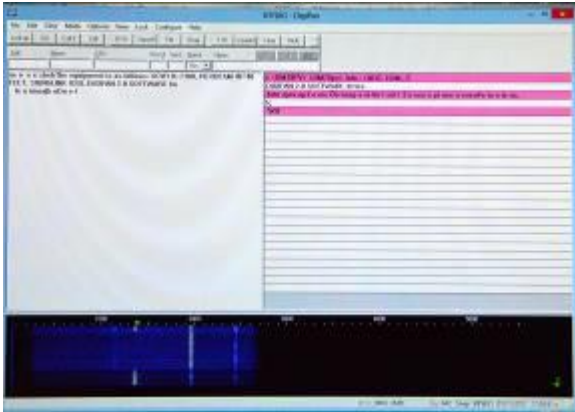

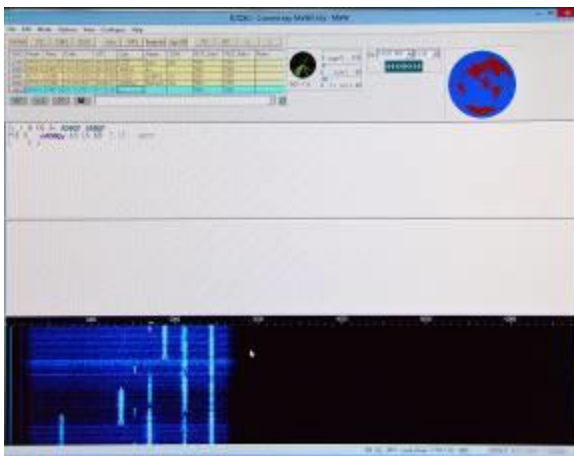

Here 'n There

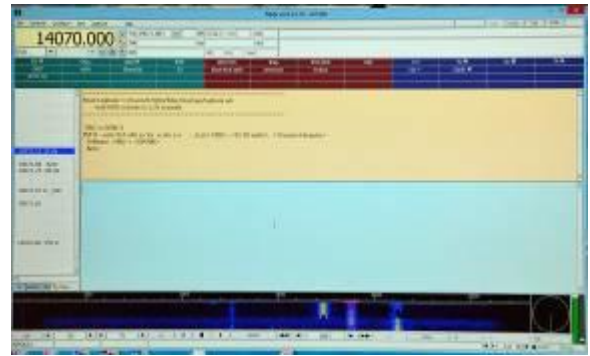
I've had several inquiries about digital software and the various digital modes with the focus on BPSK31. So this month the column will be about the more popular software in use for operating PSK31 (BPSK31).



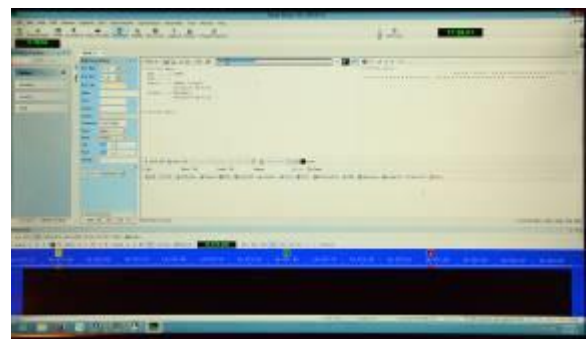
DIGIPAN

The above screen shots tell us that the user interface becomes more complex with an increasingly difficult learning curve as we ask the software to do more for us.

RECOMMENDATION #1: Start with Digipan, even if you are a seasoned operator or computer guru. You will be less likely to embarrass yourself on the air. After a few days of making PSK contacts, install and move up to software that offers more modes and functions, even though it may be learning intensive. That brings us to **RECOMMENDATION #2:** MixW is the next easiest to use, but it costs \$50! If you now feel comfortable with PSK31, and know a bit about computers, you can try FLdigi. It is FREE and has a superb operating manual. This

is the software I presently use for several modes.

What about the “King” of digital software – HRD-DM780, which costs over \$90? I have it on the PC, and had used it for nearly two years when it died on me. It caused me lots of grief as I spent 5 days trying to get it to receive. I gave up and began using FLDigi, and I am very happy I did. I have revived HRD+DM780, but still prefer many aspects of FLDigi.

INTERFACES really are the heart and soul of digital. Some require use of the PC sound card, which presents configuration problems. However, if you use the really expensive ones from MicroHam, you will have configuration headaches that would challenge a NASA engineer. I recommend a USB type, such as **SignalLink**. This is a very popular interface and more than 70% of the hams I work on PSK are using *SignalLink*. See photos below of *SignalLink* and RigBlaster plus. I have used different versions of RigBlaster for more than 16 years. My present one still works, but it has 6 cables on the back and one up front. That means everything must be plugged into the proper PC sockets and you must use the PC soundcard. *SignalLink* now comes with USB cables designed for your specific radio and has its own sound card built in.

AE7OA uses *SignalLink* and has only one cable going to a USB on the PC, and one cable going to his Data/Packet Port on his FT-2000.

What is the best way to learn to use digital modes? A ROADS meeting program would only allow enough time for a brief overview, which won't help much. I strongly recommend a visit to a station running digital so you can see firsthand what the units look like and get a glimpse



of the configuration involved. If a quick look at the configuration doesn't send you running, then you are ready to try the digital modes.

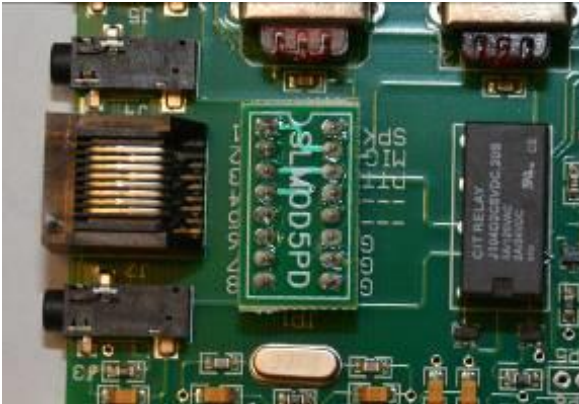
Digital Epilogue

Shortly after writing this column I fired up on PSK 31 and made several contacts on PSK and RTTY, including Haiti and the Azores. Later in the evening, I received an email from a TA1 station (Turkey) who had seen my signal! Amazing! I used FLDigi for the QSOs and it performed flawlessly. The next day I made several contacts on 20 Meter PSK, and then finished up the day with a RTTY QSO on 15 Meters with North Cook Island. For everyone who says the bands are dead, it isn't so. You need to use many different modes and spend some time checking out the bands. QSOs do not come easy during the down side of the sunspot cycle, but with some effort they are there for those who are willing to seek them out.

SignalLink 1 - 2 – 3 !

This brief technical article will describe an interface that allows you to use many of the digital modes. Detailed instruction is not provided because the SignalLink USB unit comes with ample detailed instructions for installing and using the unit. These days the hard work has been done and you can nearly use Plug & Play methods to get the unit up and running. First, let's see what we get in the package when it arrives from the Tigertronics distribution point in Grants Pass, Oregon.



The SignalLink unit is about the size of two decks of cards. A mini DVD contains nu-

merous software apps for operating PSK, RTTY and other digital modes. Shown are two cables. One connects to the digital/packet port on my FT-2000 and the other connects SignalLink to my PC. Ample instructions are found in expansive directions. Not shown is the Plug & Play jumper module that I have already installed in the unit.

The module is inexpensive, and eliminates the need to install several jumper wires that make the SignalLink compatible with your specific brand and model of transceiver. It is a real time saver and prevents installation errors.

This unit is now ready for Stage 2 of the installation, but that is covered in detail in the Tigertronics directions. Perhaps a future article will cover the ins and outs of getting it all to work with a Microsoft OS.

ARRL – The Amateur Radio Parity Act died in committee last year due to a "hold" placed on the bill a member of the Florida congressional committee for no apparent reason. Enough Florida ham radio operators flooded his office with comments that the congressman has relented and the bill has been reintroduced into this year's bills. Please write your congressmen to support this bill. Yes we can change the outcome when we stand together.

Question was asked if the wording of the honorary membership was correct for Irene Boswell. This was tabled until the new bylaws was passed and then compare it to the membership wording in the new section.

It was moved and seconded to pay the bills.

Article V

Membership

Section 1

The membership of the Club shall consist of any person who is registered in the official records of the Club and their dues have been paid.

Section 2

~~All licensed radio amateurs shall be eligible for regular membership. All other persons interested in amateur radio shall be eligible for associate membership. Associate member shall enjoy all rights and privileges, including the right to vote, except they shall not be eligible to hold office.~~

Types of members

Regular member - Must be a licensed amateur radio operator. Regular members will have voting privileges and the ability to hold office. Normal dues must be paid to remain a member in good standing.

Associate Member – Any person who expresses an interest in amateur radio. Associate members will have the right to vote but will not have the right to hold office. Normal dues must be paid to remain a member in good standing.

Life member – Will be a regular member who has made a significant contribution or impact on the club or radio community. To become a life member, they must be recommended by the board and successfully voted on by the membership. Dues are not a requirement to maintain a life membership.

Honorary member – Any member who the board or the members feels would enjoy the radio community and would benefit from a membership. To become an honorary member, one must be nominated and successfully voted on by the membership. Honorary members do not pay dues, vote or hold office. They will be added to the membership mailing list and encouraged to attend club functions.

Section 3

Each applicant for membership must express a willingness to abide by these articles and bylaws and such rules as shall, from time to time, be promulgated by the club. A copy of bylaws will be made available upon request.
